Voter registration in the State of Nevada continues to increase. As of the end of December 1998, a total of 906,205 people were registered to vote in Nevada. This includes 375,855 Democrats, 378,170 Republicans, 126,687 Nonpartisans, 16,766 Independent Americans, and 4,902 Libertarians. A table showing total voter registration by county in Nevada, as well as by legislative district, is included in Attachment F of this report.

Congressional Term Limits

The 1996 and 1998 General Election Ballots included an initiative proposal to establish term limits for the members of Congress. Question No. 17, also known as the Congressional Term Limits Act of 1996, was approved at both elections and thereby amended the *Nevada Constitution* concerning term limits. Specifically, this measure instructs Nevada's Congressional Delegation

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Mr. DuBois stated a person could never vote, and yet remain on the voter rolls as long as they returned the postcard from the registrar's of voters office indicating they would like to remain on the voter rolls. Mr. Adler felt if someone did not regularly vote they would not want to remain on the voter rolls. He also stated that all those people who did not return the postcard would be purged.

MRS. WISDOM MOVED TO AMEND AND DO PASS AB 476.

MR. WILLIAMS SECONDED THE MOTION.

THE MOTION CARRIED WITH MR. DUBOIS VOTING IN OPPOSITION.

Assembly Bill No. 589 - Extends provision which allows voter to express opposition to all candidates to include offices of state senator and assemblyman.

Eileen B. Brookman, Assemblyman District No. 9, sponsor of AB 589, testified. Ms. Brookman stated the "none of the above" option on election ballots should be included on all races which includes those candidates running for the offices of Senator and Assemblyman. Ms. Brookman suggested the bill be amended to have the "none of the above" option listed on all political races or the "none of the above" option should be completely taken off the ballot.

Chairman Swain then called Secretary of State, Prankie Sue Del Papa to testify. Chairman Swain asked Ms. Del Papa regarding a law suit dealing with write-in candidates. Ms. Del Papa said the A.C.L.U. is planning to sue the Secretary of State's office in reference to ballot access. Ms. Del Papa stated, in light of this, her office will have to draft regulations which will allow for a write-in ballot. Chairman Swain asked if there was any correlation between the two issues. Ms. Del Papa felt there was not.

Ms. Del Papa stated that Robin Bogich, Registrar of Voters for Washoe County, notified her office concerning the "none of the above" option. Mr. Bogich stated under current law the "none of the above" option is only required in statewide elections.

Mr. Fay asked Ms. Brookman if printing "none of the above" on ballots costs more money. Ms. Brookman said that it did.

Mr. Williams said "none of the above" allows the voter to make a statement. Ms. Brookman said failure to vote for either candidate would make a statement. She added doing away with the

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"none of the above" option would force voters to look at the candidates on the ballot more cautiously. Voters would have to decide upon a candidate before they went to the polls instead of opting for the "none of the above" category.

Chairman Swain informed the committee about a bill dealing with the federal voting act which will come before the committee in a short time. She stated that the bill will deal with access to the ballot by persons who are overseas in the armed forces. Chairman Swain brought this up in light of the "write-in" issue. Chairman Swain asked if it would be wise to discuss the "none of the above" issue within the upcoming bill. Ms. Del Papa suggested N.R.S. 293.269, which deals with the "none of the above" option, should be repealed in its entirety.

Mr. Bergevin asked if the "write-in" ballot amendment had been proposed due to the A.C.L.U. suit. Mr. Bergevin stated that if this were the case, he would not be in favor of adding the "none of the above" amendment in AB 589 to that bill.

Ms. Del Papa stated the A.C.L.U. suit is against a legitimate concern. Ms. Del Papa suggested a meeting between Jennifer Stern, the deputy attorney general, Chairman Swain and herself to decide on the most expeditious route to get the federal voting rights bill through and take care of the write-in ballot problem. Chairman Swain asked if it would be wise to deal with the issues in AB 589 at that time. Ms. Del Papa stated that if this statute was repealed they would actually be substituting a new statute, because the federal voting provision would be a new statutory provision. Chairman Swain felt it would be best to deal with the write in issue separately and called for a motion on AB 589.

MR. BERGEVIN MOVED TO AMEND AB 589 BY REPEALING N.R.S. 293.269 IN ITS ENTIRETY.

MR. WILLIAMS SECONDED THE MOTION

THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Chairman Swain then closed the hearing on AB 589 and opened the hearing on AB 593.

Assembly Bill No. 593 - Revises provisions relating to identification and challenge of person intending to vote.

John B. DuBois, Assemblyman District 2, sponsor of AB 593, testified. Mr. DuBois said AB 593 adds a clause which states a voter must not be allowed to vote unless he first presents a form

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A roll call vote was taken.

THE MOTION CARRIED BY A VOTE OF 6 TO 3 WITH MR. PAY, MR. PORTER & MRS. WISDOM VOTING AGAINST.

Chairman Swain then asked the committee to reconsider the vote the committee had taken on AB 589.

MR. NICHOLAS MOVED TO RECONSIDER THE VOTE ON AB 589.

MRS. WISDOM SECONDED THE MOTION.

THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

Chairman Swain then asked the committee if they would like to hear further testimony on AB 589, reconsider the bill in its original form, or amend the bill to include congressmen, as this office also did not include a "none of the above" option.

MRS. WISDOM MOVED TO AMEND AB 589 TO INCLUDE CONGRESSMEN.

MR. NICHOLAS SECONDED THE MOTION.

Mr. Bergevin stated that he would allow the reconsideration, however, his attitude had not changed. He felt the committee had succumbed to outside pressures and would vote for a total repeal of the bill.

Mr. Porter agreed with the remarks of Mr. Bergevin, stating the committee's original decision had not been spontaneous or abrupt, he also opposed the new motion.

THE MOTION DID NOT CARRY.

Chairman Swain then called for a motion on AB 589.

MR. NICHOLAS MOVED TO INDEFINITELY POSTPONE AB 589.

MRS. EVANS SECONDED THE MOTION.

Assembly Bill No. 216 - Extends provision which allows voter to express opposition to all listed candidates to include candidates for offices of state senator and assemblyman.

Assemblyman Eileen Brookman, District 9, bill sponsor, began her testimony by saying A.B. 216 was drafted incorrectly, however, she had chosen not to change the bill, (Exhibit C). She continued by saying she had appeared before the Elections Committee last session to have the whole section of "none of the above" repealed. She added A.B. 216, as written, included "legislators" running for office. This plus other candidates running for office was the intent of A.B. 336 of the 1975 session, which she supported. At that time, however, the Senate removed all candidates except those running for statewide offices.

Mrs. Brookman continued to validate her position as she explained the public disdain and mockery launched at Nevada because of the "none of the above" law, (See Exhibit C). She then requested the committee repeal the whole section of "none of the above" and replace it with a "write in."

Mrs. Wisdom asked for verification of her own interpretation of Mrs. Brookman's testimony. Mrs. Brookman reiterated that she wanted the committee to repeal the whole "none of the above" section, and if that was not to the committee's liking to provide for a "write in" law. Mrs. Brookman then responded to Mrs. Wisdom's request for additional people to testify by saying the people had missed the plane.

Mr. Sheerin wanted clarification on what had to be repealed to revoke the "none of the above" concept and the procedure involved. He asked if Dana Bennett, Research Analyst, could determine this and return to the committee with a potential

Mr. DuBois asked if the committee did not repeal the "none of the above" section if Mrs. Brookman would be receptive to adding the Assembly and Senate names to the statute. Mrs. Brookman replied by saying she would like to see the law repealed. She then pointed out an embarrassment in the 1986 primary when "none of the above" won the election. She added that a mailer in her district indicated her constituents They believed all candidates thought the law ridiculous. should be included or the law repealed.

The Chair requested that Dana Bennett check into the possible change in the statute and report back to committee.

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MRS. EVANS MOVED TO DO PASS A.B. 82.

MRS. WISDOM SECONDED THE MOTION.

THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Mrs. Swain opened the Work Session on A.B. 216.

Assembly Bill No. 216 - Extends provision which allows voter to express opposition to all listed candidates to include candidates for offices of state senator and assemblyman.

Because she was absent the day of testimony, Mrs. Swain asked for clarification of the author's intent. Mrs. Lambert replied by saying Mrs. Brookman felt the "none of the above" on the ballot was an embarrassment to the State of Nevada and should be removed from the ballot. She wanted the bill amended to repeal.

At that point, Mr. DuBois voiced approval for "none of the above." His rationale was he had never been approached on the idiocy of the inclusion, and he thought it gave voters an opportunity to indicate how they felt about a given slate. He was challenged about his logic by Mrs. Swain when he added the inclusion could force the process to function better, could attract better candidates.

MR. PORTER MOVED TO INDEFINITELY POSTPONE A.B. 216.

MR. DUBOIS SECONDED THE MOTION.

Mr. Porter remarked he believed "none of the above" served a function in the expression of the political process, usually construed as a protest vote. He also believed the voters should have the option of expressing they were not satisfied with any candidate on the ballot.

Mrs. Evans asked for clarification on what candidates were included in the "none of the above" category. Her position was that either all or none of the contests should have the item on their slates.

The Chair called for a roll call vote on the motion on the floor.

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THE MOTION FAILED BY VOTE OF SIX AGAINST, TWO IN FAVOR AND ONE ABSENT. ASSEMBLYMEN BERGEVIN, EVANS, LAMBERT, SHEERIN, WISDOM AND SWAIN VOTED AGAINST; ASSEMBLYMEN DUBOIS AND PORTER VOTED IN FAVOR; ASSEMBLYMAN DIAMOND WAS ABSENT.

The Chair then accepted a motion from Mr. Bergevin.

MR. BERGEVIN MOVED TO AMEND TO REPEAL NRS 293.269

MRS. LAMBERT SECONDED THE MOTION.

The Chair called for a roll call vote on the motion on the floor.

THE MOTION PASSED BY VOTE OF SIX IN FAVOR, TWO AGAINST AND ONE ABSENT. ASSEMBLYMAN DUBOIS AND PORTER VOTED AGAINST; ASSEMBLYMAN DIAMOND WAS ABSENT.

Mrs. Swain opened the hearing on A.B. 132.

Assembly Bill No. 132 - Clarifies definition of "political party."

Mrs. Swain passed out copies of the amended bill, (Exhibit E), wherein Mrs. Wisdom stated the revision did not contain two suggestions made by Mr. Sheerin because the Counsel Bureau believed those suggestions were already in the bill. Both Frankie Sue Del Papa, Secretary of State and Karen Zupon, Deputy Secretary of State were in concurrence with the amendments as written. Mr. Sheerin then remarked his concerns were resolved in the amendments.

Mr. DuBois asked for time to review the bill. Mrs. Wisdom stated she and Assemblymen Bergevin and Sheerin had met on the floor regarding the bill. After that she had the Secretary of State validate their revisions. Mr. Sheerin commented they had only reviewed the one section, not the entire bill. The Chair advised that with the exception of the amendment, the bill had been acceptable to the committee. She added the part of the amendment on the second page referring to Julian dating was a correction requested to facilitate both parties obtaining necessary information.

Mrs. Swain, by request of Assemblyman Brookman, called for a motion on A.B. 216 to rescind the motion that had amended the bill and passed it out of committee.

Mrs. Evans asked for clarification of committee action on the bill. She was told by the Chair the amendment voided the original bill which called for ballot inclusion of "none of the above" on candidates for offices of state senator and assemblyman. In lieu of that inclusion, the amendment eliminated the "none of the above" category from all Nevada ballots. Mrs. Swain advised the committee Mrs. Brookman's request was to follow procedure by first rescinding the amendment, then to indefinitely postpone action on the bill.

MR. PORTER MOVED TO RESCIND THE MOTION WHEREBY THE COMMITTEE HAD AMENDED AND PASSED OUT OF COMMITTEE A.B. 216.

MR. DUBOIS SECONDED THE MOTION.

Mr. DuBois explained his reason for seconding the motion was to put back into the bill the "none of the above" inclusion for state assemblymen and senators. Mrs. Swain confirmed his thought processes saying the bill was to be put back into its original form, then postponed indefinitely.

THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

MRS. WIDSOM MOVED TO INDEFINITELY POSTPONE A.B.216.

MRS. LAMBERT SECONDED THE MOTION.

THE MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Mrs. Swain opened the Work Session on A.B. 384.

Although "None of These Candidates" cannot actually win the race, it is an opportunity for voters to register opposition.

You will note that "None of These Candidates" has finished first in races in 1976, 1978 and 1986. Of course, the candidate in second place was the victor. Other notable races include its finish ahead of both George Bush and Ted Kennedy in the 1980 presidential primary.

The Nevada Revised Statute (NRS) which outlines the provision of "None of These Candidates" follows:

NRS 293.269 Ballots for statewide offices or President and Vice President must permit voter to register opposition to all candidates.

- 1. Every ballot upon which appears the names of candidates for any statewide office or for President and Vice President of the United States shall contain for each office an additional line equivalent to the lines on which the candidates' names appear and placed at the end of the group of lines containing the names of the candidates for that office. Each additional line shall contain a square in which the voter may express his choice of that line in the same manner as he would express his choice of a candidate, and the line shall read "None of these candidates."
- 2. Only votes cast for the named candidates shall be counted in determining nomination or election to any statewide office or presidential nominations or the selection of presidential electors, but for each office the number of ballots on which the additional line was chosen shall be listed following the names of the candidates and the number of their votes in every posting, abstract and proclamation of the results of the election.
- 3. Every sample ballot or other instruction to voters prescribed or approved by the secretary of state shall clearly explain that the voter may mark his choice of the line "None of these candidates" only if he has not voted for any candidate for the office.
