
# Methodology

Public Opinion Strategies is pleased to present the key findings of a statewide telephone survey conducted in Nevada. The survey was completed February 16-18, 2013, among 500 likely voters, with 125 cell phone interviews, and has a margin of error of +4.38%.

Glen Bolger was the principal researcher on this project. Jim Hobart was the project director, and Kyle Clark provided analytical support.

## Voters across party lines support collecting the Amazon tax early.

"Still thinking about taxes, as you may know, Amazon is scheduled to begin collecting sales taxes on online purchases made in Nevada in 2014. Would you favor or oppose the state starting such a requirement on all online retailers six months earlier in order to increase the state and local tax revenues in 2013 by about \$150 million?"






# The Margin Tax


# Nevadans strongly favor the Education Initiative's margin tax.

"Would you favor or oppose a ballot question called the Education Initiative that would create an additional two percent tax, called a margin tax, on all non-gaming businesses whose net revenue exceeds one million dollars, with all tax revenues being used to fund education?"




### Only base GOPers oppose the margin tax.

#### Education Initiative Ballot by Party




### Voters across all regions back the margin tax.

#### Education Initiative Ballot by Region




# Older men oppose the initiative, while all other gender/age groups and seniors support it.

Education Initiative Ballot by Gender/Age + Seniors




## Conservatives largely oppose the margin tax, while moderates and liberals strongly support it.

Education Initiative Ballot by Kids/Grandkids




# Nevadans remain divided on the potential impact of the margin tax.

### Base partisans are mirror opposites; Independents believe the margin tax will raise prices and the unemployment rate and will hurt business.



# A majority of voters say they agree with the opponents of the margin tax.

Supporters of the margin tax say that adding a tax on businesses will not increase prices and note that large retail store prices in Nevada are not lower than in other states that already do tax businesses.






# A plurality of voters support the creation of an appeals court in Nevada.


### Democrats back the creation of an appeals court; Independents are divided, and GOPers are opposed.

By Gender/Age + Seniors






# Minimum Wage

### Voters are divided over whether some Nevada employers should have to pay a higher minimum wage.


"Changing topics..."

As you may know, Nevada law requires that employees who do not provide health insurance coverage pay a minimum wage that is one dollar higher than the federal minimum wage. Currently, there is a proposal to increase the federal minimum wage to nine dollars an hour, which would increase the minimum in Nevada to ten dollars an hour for Nevada employers who do not provide health insurance coverage. Do you favor or oppose changing Nevada law to eliminate this requirement that some Nevada employers pay a higher minimum wage?




### Split decision: GOPers and Independents are divided on the minimum wage proposal, and soft Democrats have broken ranks with base Democrats.

Minimum Wage by Region









'In September's survey, the question was worded, "Do you think that the school system can be improved through increased spending or do you also believe that the system needs significant reforms in order to improve results?"




# Legalizing marijuana is a generational issue. Younger voters overwhelmingly support it, while only seniors are opposed.

### Fully three-quarters of Nevada voters support drug testing applicants for welfare benefits.


"Would you favor or oppose Nevada requiring drug tests of people who apply for welfare benefits, even if the benefits are not for them but for their children?"








# Younger voters strongly support removing the Protection of Marriage provision. Seniors oppose removing the provision.

 $51^{\circ}$  No changes to the gun laws in the state should be made.


### Not surprisingly, Democrats, liberals, and voters unfavorable to the Tea Party believe the state's gun laws should be tightened.



"On a different subject, would you favor or oppose legislation that would legalize online gambling in Nevada?"




### Voters are split in the Las Vegas DMA, while online gambling has solid support in Reno.




## Older women and seniors oppose online gambling legalization, while younger voters are more supportive.
